PMHNP: education-to-practice pathway

An educational overview of how psychiatric mental health nurse practitioners (PMHNPs) train, certify, and become licensed to practice. Nursing and state rules vary; verify current requirements.

Education

- A registered nurse background, then a graduate PMHNP program at the master's (MSN) or doctoral (DNP) level
- Supervised clinical hours across the lifespan, since the PMHNP role is a lifespan population focus

National certification

Graduates sit the American Nurses Credentialing Center (ANCC) PMHNP board certification examination to earn the PMHNP-BC credential.

State licensure and practice authority

- Apply for advanced practice registered nurse (APRN) licensure in each state where patients are located
- Practice authority varies by state, which the AANP groups into full, reduced, and restricted
- Reduced and restricted states require a collaboration or supervision agreement with a physician for some or all practice, including prescribing

Prescribing and identifiers

PMHNPs who prescribe need an NPI and, for controlled substances, a DEA registration and any required state controlled-substance registration. Telehealth follows the patient's physical location. Verify current state rules.
